Downy Woodpecker



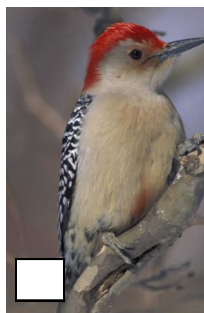
Feed: Insects, seeds and berries

Environment: Forested Areas

Facts: Is the smallest woodpecker in North America



Red-Bellied Woodpecker



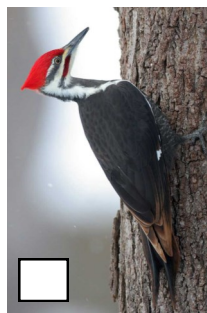
Feed: Insects, nuts, berries, foraging in dead trees

Environment: Lightly wooded areas

Facts: Uses tapping sounds in courtship



Pileated Woodpecker



Feed: Carpenter ants, fruits, nuts and berries

Environment: Heavily wooded forests

Facts: Is the largest woodpecker in the US.



Blue Jay



Feed: Nuts, seeds, acorns, soft fruits, small animals

Environment: Lightly forested areas

Facts: when predatory birds are near the Jay will alarm.



Wood Duck



Feed: Berries, acorns, seeds, insects

Environment: Wooded marshes

Facts: Helped by increasing beaver population



Northern Cardinal



Feed: Insects, seeds, fruits

Environment: Forests

Facts: Single mate for life

Feed: Insects, frogs, seeds

Environment: Light forest

Facts: South Carolina state bird.



Mourning Dove



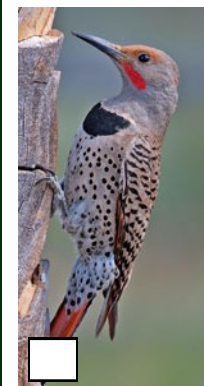
Feed: Seeds

Environment: Urban Areas

Facts: Closely related to the extinct Passenger Pigeon



Northern Flicker



Feed: Insects, nuts, berries, foraging in dead trees

Environment: Lightly wooded areas

Facts: Is the state bird of Alabama



White Throated Sparrow



Feed: Insects, seeds, berries

Environment: Lightly wooded areas

Facts: Both genders are nearly identical



House Finch



Feed: Seeds, berries

Environment: Semi-open areas

Facts: Used to be called "Hollywood Finches"



Black-capped Chickadee



Feed: Seeds, insects, berries

Environment: Lightly wooded areas

Facts: Can greatly lower their body temperature and are very friendly



Gold Finch



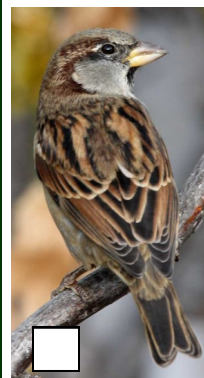
Feed: Strict herbivore

Environment: Fields

Feed: Insects, seeds, weeds

Environment: Everywhere

Facts: Is one of the most widely distributed birds in the world
